Emergency Overview: This product is a heavy based odorless sealer with various colors and no flash point.

Potential Acute Health Effects:

Eye: Exposure may cause mild eye irritation. Symptoms may include stinging, tearing, and redness.

Skin: Exposure may cause mild skin irritation. Prolonged or repeated exposure may dry the skin. Symptoms may include redness, burning, drying and cracking, and skin burns. Pre-existing skin disorders may be aggravated by exposure to this material.

Section 4 First Aid Measures

Eye contact: Flush eyes immediately with large amounts of water for at least 15 minutes. Get medical attention.

Floors may be slippery, care should be exercised to avoid falls during clean up operations

Handling: Keep from freezing. Product may coagulate.

Storage: Storage temperature max 49°C/120°F; min 1°C/34°F

Section 8 Exposure Controls / Personal Protection

Engineering Controls: Use in well-ventilated areas. If necessary, use mechanical local exhaust ventilation or general room dilution ventilation to reduce vapor concentrations below applicable exposure limits.

Eye Protection: Prevent eye contact. Wear chemical splash goggles or similar eye protection if the potential exists for eye contact.
